#### **Introduction to Albanian**

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### Day 1: Albanian Phonology/Orthography/Clusters/Vocabulary (for fun)

A. There are several letters in the Albanian alphabet that are familiar letters from Western European languages or similar to familiar ones that have a very different phonetic value; consider:

All other letters have their familiar and expected values as Latin-based characters (including  $\mathbf{sh}$  (= [ $\mathfrak{f}$ ]) and  $\mathbf{th}$  (= [ $\mathfrak{f}$ ]); note also that  $\mathbf{ng}$  (usually [ $\mathfrak{f}$ ] but sometimes [ $\mathfrak{fg}$ ]) is not treated as a separate letter (while other digraphs are).

mirë dita 'hello' (lit. "good day")

mirupafshim 'goodbye' (lit. "well each-other may-we-see", i.e. 'may we see each-other well')

po 'yes

si jeni 'how are-you?' ('you' = plural or polite singular)

si je 'how are you?' ('you' = singular) tungjatjeta 'hello' (lit. "may life be lengthened")
